Smack Mellon is pleased to announce the opening of *Art Ready: Selected Work from the Artist Mentorship Program*. The exhibition presents the work of students who participated in the 2017-2018 session of Art Ready, Smack Mellon's arts mentorship program for high school students interested in pursuing a career in the visual arts. This year students worked with professional artists who specialize in painting, drawing, sculpture, jewelry-making, graphic design, and videography. During the spring semester students have experimented with practices such as paper casting, figurative drawings, sculpture, printmaking, collage, and magazine branding. Included in the show will be an impressive range of media such as painting, animation, and a fashion show among others.

Art Ready is a mentorship program designed to give students the opportunity to experience firsthand what it is like to be a professional working in a visual arts discipline. Students are exposed to a wide variety of artists and arts professionals, participate in mentorships, and visit museums and galleries. This year, the Art Ready group took field trips to such cultural venues as A.I.R., Art in General, and Minus Space. Individual mentor groups' excursions included the Met Breuer, Sharpe-Walentas Studios, and the Whitney Museum of American Art.
